

Highlights for this quarter

Myanmar National Plan nears Completion
The Myanmar National Task Force for the development of their National Oil Spill Contingency Plan continues the good work with two meetings with various stakeholders in Quarter 2 period. The development is near the final stages now and is on track to be finalized at the end of 2018.

10th Thailand Oil Spill Response Exercise
This annual event is led by the Marine Department with support from Ministry of Transport, Royal Thai Navy, Oil Industry Environmental Safety Group Association (ESGA), Pollution Control Department (PCD) and Geo-Informatics and Space Technology Department Agency (GISTDA) in accordance to the requirement of the country's National Plan. GISEA has the honour to observe the three-day national event which included panel discussions, tabletop exercise and on-water deployment exercises with support from drones and Navy helicopter. The event ended with a shoreline demonstration involving local community participation.

Preparedness Mission to Viet Nam
As part of GISEA project planning, GISEA had conducted a preparedness mission to Viet Nam. With the support from Viet Nam Maritime Administration, GISEA had engaged with various stakeholders in Viet Nam to identify key areas to focus on for improving the oil spill response capability for the country.

IMO CONVENTIONS

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION ON OIL POLLUTION PREPAREDNESS, RESPONSE AND CO-OPERATION, 1990 (OPRC 1990)

The International Convention on Oil Pollution Preparedness, Response and Co-operation 1990 (OPRC 90) is the international instrument that provides a framework designed to facilitate international co-operation and mutual assistance in preparing for and responding to major oil pollution incidents and requires States to plan and prepare by developing national systems for pollution response in their respective countries, and by maintaining adequate capacity and resources to address oil pollution emergencies.

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION ON CIVIL LIABILITY FOR OIL POLLUTION DAMAGE (CLC)

The Civil Liability Convention was adopted to ensure that adequate compensation is available to persons who suffer oil pollution damage resulting from maritime casualties involving oil-carrying ships. The Convention places the liability for such damage on the owner of the ship from which the polluting oil escaped or was discharged.

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION ON THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INTERNATIONAL FUND FOR COMPENSATION FOR OIL POLLUTION DAMAGE (IOPC FUND)

The 1992 Fund Convention, which is supplementary to the 1992 CLC, establishes a regime for compensating victims whose claims under the 1992 CLC is not available or is inadequate. The International Oil Pollution Compensation Fund, 1992 (IOPC Fund) was established under the Convention.

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION ON LIABILITY AND COMPENSATION FOR DAMAGE IN CONNECTION WITH THE CARRIAGE OF OILY SUBSTANCES BY SEA, 1996 (HNS CONVENTION)

The HNS Convention was adopted in 1996 to insure adequate and efficient compensation to victims of accidents involving HNS, such as chemicals. The Convention is based on the liability system established under the CLC.

At a Glance

IMO Conventions

The majority of conventions adopted under the auspices of IMO or for the Organization is otherwise responsible, fall into three main categories. The first group is concerned with maritime safety; the second with the prevention of marine pollution; and the third with compensation, especially in relation to damage caused by oil pollution. Outside these major groupings are a number of other conventions dealing with facilitation, tonnage measurement, unfair trade against shipping and salvage, etc. For more information on these and other IMO Conventions please visit their website.


OIL SPILL RESPONSE
